

Year 6 Autumn 2023 Curriculum Information



What we are learning at school

Maths

At the Grove, we follow 'Herts Essentials' and will be covering the following units: number and place value; mental calculation and problem-solving including time; fractions; multiplication and division; statistics. During this first term, we will be focusing heavily on securing and mastering our arithmetic skills. In the build up to SATs, we will be completing weekly arithmetic papers, which will be marked and handed back to the children for self-assessment of what they need to work on. Children always take great pride in their improvements through these weekly tests.

English

To start the term, we will be focusing on complex sentence construction and grammar. This will be taught alongside a whole school text: 'The Black Book of Colours' by Menena Cottin, which explores the world of colours through the perspective of blind people. In coming weeks, we will be using 'The Lost Words' poetry by Robert Macfarlane to inspire vocabulary choices and 'The Explorer' by Katherine Rundle to create powerful character descriptions. Other texts we will be using include: 'Plasticus Maritimus' by Ana Pego and Isabel Minhos Martins and 'The Highwayman' by Alfred Noyes.

Science

Our Science focus will start on Light.

Big Question: If there was no light, what would we see?

The areas of study will include: recognising that light travels in straight lines and that objects are seen because they give out, or reflect, light into the eye.

We will also investigate how shadows are formed and what factors can affect the size and shape of shadows.

Then we will move on to discovering Living Things and their Habitats with life cycles and classification. Our Big question will be: How and why do scientists classify living things?

History

We will be starting an in-depth exploration into World War One and Two. In the Autumn term, we will specifically be focusing on the First World War and the events that led to it, key figures, and life at this time across the world. Throughout this unit, we will be immersing children in books, writing and experiences from this time.

Geography

Children will be developing **locational knowledge**, using maps to locate the world's countries and continents with a focus on and South America, looking at the key physical features and the human characteristics including major cities.

We will then apply a range of geographical skills to a case study of South America. Focusing on: countries, varying climates, topographical features and current issues surrounding climate change and deforestation.

Art

We will be building on our painting skills from previous years by trying to more accurately mix paints to create very specific tones. Once we have mastered this, we will explore more closely how contrasting and adjacent colours can be used for effect. Combining our art with history, we will analyse the colour choices of artist throughout history and identify trends and styles for particular eras. We will be focusing particularly on the Fauvism movement.

Computing

During the Autumn term, we will be starting the term, like every year, by looking at online safety and how to stay safe while accessing the internet. In year 6, children begin to have a lot more freedom and access to devices and it is vital that they understand and use the tools available to them, that are designed to keep them safe. We will also be exploring coding elements and how they link to creating interactive stories, Binary systems, Networks and their purpose. We will be using the Purple Mash scheme to support lessons.

In Music this term, we will continue to build on the understanding of the Ukulele. We will continue to use new chords and learn a range of songs together and in parts. Through these lessons, we will also look at a range of artists and how the use of this instrument has changed.
